Recent rains bring relief, BUT DROUGHT CONTINUES

After nine atmospheric rivers slammed California, many people are wondering – are we still in a drought? It's too soon to say. The state will continue to evaluate factors like Sierra Nevada snowpack through April, and the reality is, we simply don't know what the rest of winter has in store. The recent storms did however provide enough water to give California's reservoirs a needed boost, bringing many to historically average levels. This is good news after three years of drought had left key storage facilities critically low. But the Colorado River is still in crisis and our groundwater basins need replenishment.



What's crystal clear is that California is going to

continue experiencing flashy, unpredictable weather—long droughts punctuated by big, fast-moving storms. The feast or famine nature of our climate calls for new ideas and bold action from our state – we need infrastructure and resource management tools that allow us to capture water from these big storm events. It also means that we as individuals need to embrace efficiency as a way of life. We do not know when the next storm will come. We do not know when or how long the next drought will be. EVMWD is grateful that our customers have diligently conserved water throughout this ongoing drought, and we ask that you continue to do so as we make our way through the uncertainty of winter.





EVMWD'S 2023 ANNUAL SPLASH INTO SPRING COMMUNITY EVENT

Join EVMWD for the annual Splash into Spring event scheduled to take place Saturday, March 25, from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. at the district's headquarters – located at 31315 Chaney Street in Lake Elsinore. The annual community water festival is a FREE family event where attendees will learn about the process EVMWD uses to treat more than 5.5 million gallons of sewer water per day, the construction and maintenance of more than 700 miles of pipeline throughout the EVMWD service area and saving money and water with a more water efficient home and landscape. Family friendly interactive displays will be set up allowing a hands-on approach to learning the operation of various departments within EVMWD. Additionally, the Wyland Clean Water Mobile Learning Experience will be on-site providing a museum-quality educational experience. It features a newly re-vamped multi-sensory theater with six interactive stations that will provide education about water quality, water resource availability, and conservation.



HAVE YOU OPTED IN TO THE SEPTIC TO SEWER AVENUES AND SEDCO HILLS CONVERSION PROJECT FOR FREE?



EVMWD is securing money from the Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF) to improve the sewer systems in the communities of Sedco Hills and Avenues.

To align with Elsinore Valley Municipal Water District's (EVMWD) Sewer Master Plan and Groundwater Protection goals, Sedco Hills and Avenues will be transitioned to the EVMWD sewer system in a phased approach over a period of 48 months. The project costs NOTHING for the property owner to participate and the project will cover the cost of construction work, all associated fees, abandonment of your septic tank, and restoration of your yard. Opting into this project will save residents an average of \$60,000 in conversion costs.

Benefits of the project impact the entire community. These include increased property value, improvement of general health, reduction of water pollution, elimination of costly septic system maintenance and repairs, and reduced septic odors.

Once you are connected to EVMWD's sewer system, your monthly EVMWD bill will include water and sewer charges based on approved fixed and variable rates. Worried about a possible bill increase?
